LISTENING TO PARENTS: THE RESULTS OF OUR STATEWIDE SURVEY OF PUBLIC SCHOOL PARENTS

KEY FINDINGS

- Parents are very concerned about their child falling behind academically as a result of not being in school. Among a long list of potential concerns, academic concerns rise to the top.
- In the immediate aftermath of school closures, New York parents give positive ratings to schools for their handling of coronavirus and the transition to remote learning overall.
- There are large gaps between what parents want and what is currently available in the early weeks of school closures with access to their child's teacher rated as what parents would find most helpful, even ahead of technology resources.
- In addition, there are clear gaps that parents feel prevent their children from successfully participating in alternatives to instruction while schools remain closed.
- This is a stressful time for parents, who have real fears about how their families will cope during this period.




PARENTS APPRECIATE HOW THEIR SCHOOLS ARE RESPONDING TO CORONAVIRUS






